

Senior Health Matters Concurrent Use of Herbal Medicinal Products and Prescription Medications

Concurrent use of herbal medicinal products (HMPs) and prescription drugs by adults aged 65 and older was reviewed in the 12-1-2017 issue of Drugs and Aging.

The most commonly combined prescription drugs where a potential adverse reaction could occur when combined with an HMP are: antihypertensives, beta blockers, diuretics, antihyperlipidemics, anticoagulants, analgesics, antihistamines, antidiabetics, antidepressants and statins. The herbal medicinal products most commonly combined were Gingko biloba, garlic, ginseng, St. John's wort, Echinacea, saw palmetto, evening primrose and ginger.

Only 1/3 of HMP users disclose their use to healthcare professionals due to a perceived negative attitude of clinicians toward complementary medicine, they are not asked about their use or the notion that HMPs are safe. However, they have the potential to do harm.

The most common potential interaction was the risk of bleeding from a combination of Gingko biloba, garlic or ginseng with aspirin, warfarin or other antithrombotic drugs. Other potential herb-drug interactions resulted in interference with the activity of statins, enhanced sedative effect of benzodiazepines, alteration in blood pressure and blood glucose, decreased hormone replacement efficacy and inhibition of calcium metabolism.

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has little control over the marketing of herbal products. The FDA may prohibit sales of herbal products containing pharmaceutical agents and may prohibit sale of an herbal product proven to have serious or unreasonable risk under conditions of use on the label or as commonly consumed. The burden of proof lies with the FDA and consumer reporting.

Ty Perkins: Born and Raised in Detroit



Ty Perkins' grandparents arrived in the United States in the early 1800s from Scotland. Ty himself was born and raised in Detroit, Michigan. He attended Edgar Guest Elementary School and graduated from Detroit Redford High School in 1945.

One and a half years of his four-year high school education was spent at Forest Hills High School in Long Island, New York. He remembers watching many professional tennis tournaments there.

After high school, he joined the United States Navy, which took him halfway around the world to Tsingtau, China. He served on a fleet tanker called the U.S.S. Tappanock.

After his tour of duty, he attended Michigan State University, (Go Green! Maynard), on the GI Bill. Out of ten thousand MSU students, six thousand were men and women attending school on the GI Bill. Ty remembers sleeping in a gym on four-tier bunks, and then he moved to the Quonset Village. He took classes in the Business School.

In 1949 Ty went to work as a salesman for his father at Perkins Sales in Detroit. In 1955

this company went bankrupt. Ty talked to Frank Stella of Stella Products, a prominent Detroit businessman. Frank was able to get Ty a job as a manufacturer's rep which he attributes to good luck and good timing.

Ty was sent to Chicago to learn about the company's product lines. Then, he returned to Detroit and continued to market and promote these products. "He was a reps rep for seven years." Ty started his own business, R. Tyler Perkins Jr. Inc. He represented companies that made products for restaurants, hotels, and universities.

Ty has been a member of the Senior Men's Club since 2011. He enjoys numerous activities of the Club. These activities include being a greeter, golfing twice a week, a member of the Men's Chorus, and a member of the Master of Ceremonies Committee. To improve the SMC, Ty suggests sponsoring members should spend more time bringing new associates to the Club.

Ty has many and varied hobbies. They include participating in productions of the Village Players. Two of his favorite shows were "Little Abner," and "Guys and Dolls." He has served two terms as President of the Village Players. He also enjoys gardening, traveling, and following figure skating competitions at World and National levels.

Ty and his wife Ann have been married 65 years. They live in Troy, Michigan and they have two daughters and one son, four grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren. They attend the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham.

He and his wife have been very active in the community. They both volunteered at SOCH—South Oakland County Homeless—for ten years where they helped feed, counsel, and get medical help for the homeless, and have volunteered for 25 years at the American Cancer Society and seven years at the Birmingham Bloomfield Art Association. In addition, they also chaired the AAUW book sale three times.
