After being discharged in 1948, Ted enrolled in the Engineering School at the University of Michigan. Later he earned an MBA from Michigan and became a Professional Engineer. Ted joined Ford Motor Company in 1953 and remained with Ford for 40 years - a real "lifer." His Ford career focused on the manufacture and assembly of engines and tractors in domestic and foreign plants. He gained a reputation for expertise in plant management, the launch of new



products, quality improvement and cost reduction. Following his retirement in 1993, Ted became a consultant.

Ted joined the SMC in 2004. He is a dedicated golfer and bowler and is active with the Investment Study Group. On Wednesday, July 2 at 10:30AM we will discuss "The God of Small Things" by

Arundhati Roy. In her first novel, award-winning Indian screenwriter Arundhati Roy conjures a whoosh of wordplay that rises from the pages like a brilliant jazz improvisation. "The God of Small



Things" is nominally the story of young twins Rahel and Estha and the rest of their family, but the book feels like a million stories spinning out indefinitely. It is the product of a genius child-mind that takes everything in and transforms it in an alchemy of poetry. "The God of Small Things" is at once exotic and familiar to the Western reader, written in English that's completely new and invigorated by the Asian Indian influences of culture and language.

On Monday, July 21 at 3:00PM we will discuss "The Children of Henry the VIII" by Alison Weir. The royal family may have its problems these days, but as Alison Weir reminds us in this cohesive and impeccably researched book, the nobility of old England could be both loveless and



ruthless. Weir, an expert in the period and author of a book on Henry's VIII wives, focuses on his children who reigned successively after his death in 1547: Edward VI, Mary I ("Bloody Mary") and Elizabeth I. The three shared little--living in separate homes--except for a familial legacy of blood and terror. This is exciting history and fascinating reading about a family of mythic proportions.

Senior Health Matters Colon/Rectal Cancer Screening Cost-Effective in Older Adults

In the June 3 issue of the Annals of Internal Medicine, the first study of its kind to look at the health benefits and cost-effectiveness of colorectal cancer (CRC) screening in people older than 75 years without prior screening has concluded that those:

- Without comorbid conditions (two diseases which occur together) are cost effective to age 86 with colonoscopy up to age 83; sigmoidoscopy at age 84 and fecal immunochemical test (FIT) at ages 85 and 86.
- With moderate comorbidities are cost-effective to age 83 with colonoscopy up to age 80; sigmoidoscopy at age 81; and FIT at ages 82 and 83.
- With severe comorbidities are cost effective up to age 80 with colonoscopy up to age 80; sigmoidoscopy at age 78 and FIT at age 79 and 80.

The authors note that those age 76 and older without prior screening have a prevalence of CRC that is 10 times greater than those who had negative screening colonoscopy at ages 50, 60 and 70.

Attendance Research Report

Attendance Chairman Dave Dinger recently reported to the Executive Board that 167 of our members did not attend any meetings last year. This finding triggered much discussion and resulted in a phone survey conducted by the Committee



asking a sample of 72 of these absent members why they didn't attend. These results were presented to the Board.


- **16** members indicated they had other interests, activities, or commitments which prevented them from attending meetings
- **13** indicated they were out of town a lot and/or were snowbirds
- 11 reported health issues their own or family
- **6** indicated transportation or parking problems (often health related)
- **8** indicated "problem" with meetings speakers or content (business portion). It should be noted that these were prompted responses not free they said yes, when asked about item
- **18** no information calls not answered or returned despite multiple attempts

Conclusions:

- We have a significant number of "checkbook members" men who want to continue membership even though they may remain relatively inactive. Many comments received about liking the Club, but are having trouble attending. Several indicated they had attended some meetings this year.
- No indication of any changes the Club could or should make that would increase attendance.


