Managing Efficient Internet Research

Three Madonna University library staffers at the September 17 Computer Group meeting provided information on the most effective methods for getting to sites searchers can trust.

Michael Cummings, Margaret Danowski and Nancy Bagnasco built their presentation around a Power Point presentation and three handouts, which were made available also at our meeting the Friday following.

Their focus was on databases funded by subscription revenue from users such as libraries, researchers. Pursuing investigations through these "directed search" channels reduces the distractions one encounters when seeking reliable data quickly.

The presentation explored Virtual Libraries, Academic Databases, Michigan Electronic Library (MEL) which one can use with a local library card or a Michigan drivers license.

The "Internet Public Library" discussion opened awareness to expanded search opportunities.

The trio encouraged electronic researchers to take question to local librarians, whom they praised as being helpful. They also provided their email addresses and invited anyone with questions to contact them.
