

George has flown over the North Pole in a small plane, helped create the first automatic transmission, created the first fleet of cars with airbags in them, beat Jesse Owens in a race, and has been a member of the ski patrol for over 30 years. He and his wife, Ann, had to postpone the interview that led to this article because they were going skiing and snowshoeing. 86 remember?!

George was steered by his father to an interest in things mechanical at an early age. As a teenager, he disassembled and reassembled an old Buick, and that led to his being hired by Buick and enrolled in General Motors Institute. At GM, he helped develop the first automatic transmission. He also helped develop the transmission used in U.S.



tanks in World War II. Later assignments including using humans in airbag testing and building the first fleet of vehicles with airbags. He learned to fly, and with two other engineers bought a small 2-engine plane in which they flew over the North Pole.

In 1936, at the Olympic tryouts, George ran a race against Jesse Owens—and won. George modestly says that Jesse claimed to be a bit ill at the time. So?

George has been an SMC member since '93 and is vice chairman of the Audio Committee. He and Ann have been married for 60 years, have four children and several grandchildren.
